ighteen (18) days have passed since the national extreme social distancing, and Batswana complied with the lockdown protocols.

With only a week left before the end of the twenty-eight (28) days lockdown, Botswana has recorded at least a total of 20 positive cases and one death.

The question that will have to be addressed is, will Botswana gradually ease regulations in various sectors to restart economic activities after the national extreme social distancing or an extension to the 28 days judging by the new confirmed cases?

Why Extension?

The latest announcement of five (5) positive confirmed cases has resulted in a total of six (6) local transmission cases. This obscures and worsen the national threat level. This new development calls for a change in strategy from community testing to a more focused contact tracing.

The results of this focused exercise will inform the development of a relevant national emergency COVID-19 response plan.

Of the 4 683 lab tests performed, 4 663 of them have tested negative which is a virtuous hope to the nation.

BOTSWANA AND ZIMBABWE CONDUCT REPATRIATION EXERCISE

otswana and Zimbabwe have jointly started a repatriation exercise following requests from Zimbabwean nationals who wanted to be assisted to return home amid the Covid-19 pandemic and the lockdown measures put in place.

A statement from Ministry of International Affairs and Cooperation says in the spirit of solidarity and the upholding existing good relations between the two countries, on 16th of April 2020, two hundred and fifty-five (255) Zimbabweans were voluntarily

repatriated from Botswana by road and received by Zimbabwean Authorities at Ramokgwebana border post. In appreciating the consequences of the lockdown on movement restrictions and in keeping with the spirit of exercise, none of the repatriated individuals was charged for breaching immigration rules.

The statement further highlighted that Botswana and Zimbabwe remain committed to work closely together in responding to the outbreak of Covid-19 and mitigating its impact on both

countries, as well as on the livelihood of their nationals, adding that the two countries will continue to collaborate voluntarily repatriations when necessary.

Okavango faces pandemic challenges

kavango DHMT Head Dr Alex Kalonji says his district is faced with a mammoth task in fighting three health issues at the same time.

In an interview with the Presidential (Covid-19) Task Force Bulletin, the DHMT Head said they are working around the clock to prevent Covid-19, fight malaria as well as preparing for waterborne diseases as water along Okavango river rises.

Dr Kalonji said they have registered 254 cases of Malaria since January 2020, including one death. He said public education is continuing to sensitise the residents about the importance of spraying at residential areas.

In addition to the fight against Malaria, Dr Kalonji said the building up of water in the Okavango river comes with health challenges such as diarrhoea and bilharzia.

He however said they are encouraging people to stay away from the water.

However, for Covid-19, Dr Kalonji said Okavango Sub District does not have a suspected case, adding that they currently have 41 people in the quarantine sites, with 30 people having so far been discharged from quarantine sites in Okavango.

SADC regional response to COVID-19

The Southern African Development Community (SADC) recorded its first case of COVID-19 in early March, and since then, the numbers have been increasing.

As of 15th April, 2020, fourteen (14) of the sixteen (16) SADC Member States have been affected by COVID-19 - Angola, Botswana, Eswatini, Democratic Republic of Congo, Madagascar, Malawi, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Seychelles, South Africa, United Republic of Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

In addition to the measures put in place by Member States, SADC has put, and will continue putting in place regional measures that are critical in responding to the COVID-19. So far, SADC has undertaken ten (10) regional coordinated actions to contain the spread of COVID-19 and mitigate its social and economic impacts on the region.

These regional actions pertain to strengthening Disaster Risk Management; suspension of regional face-to-face meetings; coordinating and monitoring the implementation of the SADC Protocol on Health, utilization of the SADC Pooled Procurement Services for pharmaceuticals and medical supplies and the adoption of regional Guidelines on Harmonisation and Facilitation of Cross Border Transport Operations across the Region during the COVID-19. Other actions include, mobilisation of regional support towards containment and mitigation of the socioeconomic impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the SADC region; and partnering with

the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to ensure continuity of education and learning programmes.

The SADC Secretariat is also monitoring and analysing the socio-economic impact of the COVID-19 on SADC economies as well as providing weekly Regional Status reports and daily updates on the status of COVID-19 in the region. SADC
