Drone Disinfection

A drone sprayer to disinfect open spaces where there is inevitable people movement like at hospitals, police, district commissioners offices, shopping areas and any other areas where there is human traffic.

- **600 litres of hand sanitisers and 5 large scale dispensers.** The Sanitiser was produced in accordance with the World Health Organisation and Botswana Bureau of Standards specifications.



- **Bar and liquid soap.** The 3000 litres of liquid soap and 500 bars of soap will be donated to essential public places in Palapye and Serowe such as health facilities, police and the less privileged members of Palapye community.



University of Botswana students initiate hand sanitisers



niversity of Botswana scientists have produced hand sanitisers in an effort to help fight COVID-19.

The production of hand sanitisers was initiated by students of School of

Pharmacy in the Faculty of Health Science to help alleviate the burden of COVID-19 infection in Botswana.

The 80 litres of topical solution hand sanitises was donated to Sir Ketumile Masire Teaching Hospital, which has been designated by the government as the principal site for management of COVID-19 patients.


The donation was part of the University's contribution towards alleviating the burden of COVID-19 on the country's health sector. Currently, sanitizers are scarce and very expensive.

The University has also designed a face shield that can be used as part of protective gear for medical personnel involved in the fight against COVID-19.

The new coronavirus CANNOT be transmitted through mosquito bites.

To date there has been no information nor evidence to suggest that the new coronavirus could be transmitted by mosquitoes. The new coronavirus is a respiratory virus which spreads primarily through droplets generated when an infected person coughs or sneezes, or through droplets of saliva or discharge from the nose. To protect yourself, clean your hands frequently with an alcohol-based hand rub or wash them with soap and water. Also, avoid close contact with anyone who is coughing and sneezing.

Frequent or excessive alcohol consumption can increase your risk of health problems.




'My Hero is You, How kids can fight COVID-19' helps children to cope

United Nations Children's Fund, in collaboration with more than 50 humanitarian organizations has released a new story book that aims to help children understand and cope with Covid-19.

"All over the world, children's lives have been completely upended, the majority of them living in countries with some form of restricted movement or lockdown," UNICEF Executive Director Henrietta Fore said in a statement Thursday.

The book would help children understand and navigate



this new landscape and learn how they can take small actions to become the heroes in their own stories. It features the fantasy creature Ario, who helps children understand how they can protect themselves, their families and friends from coronavirus, and how to manage difficult emotions when confronted with a new reality.

The book is aimed at children aged between 6 and 11, and it is widely translated in 6 language versions. It is being released as a printable version available online for download, and as an audiobook. CNN
