It's a call for Batswana to embrace local products and to actively choose to buy them, bearing in mind what that means for the individuals who produce them and the country as a whole.






It is for this reason that Batswana are encouraged to support their own, buy local produce and services, so they stay afloat despite the challenges presented by COVID19.

Lifting of the Prohibition of the Importation and sale of Tobacco or Tobacco Related Products

is Excellency President Dr Mokgweetsi Eric Keabetswe Masisi in accordance with regulation 30G of the Emergency Powers (COVID- 19) Regulations, 2020, has authorised the Lifting of the Prohibition of the Importation and sale of Tobacco and Tobacco Related Products.

Government gazette issued by the Director of Health Services states that:

- (i) A person shall not smoke in any enclosed, indoor designated non-smoking area of any private or public workplace, or in a public place.
- (ii) Notwithstanding paragraph (i) smoking may be allowed in a designated area of public place: provided that -
- (aa) the area is sealed off from the rest of the premises; (bb) a functioning extractor fan is installed in the area
- and
- (cc) social distancing protocols are observed,
- (iii) Tobacco products shall not be sold or used in any outdoor place near a school, educational institution, place of worship, health facility, playground, sports or sports arena,
- (iv) Shisha or hookah shall not be used, sold or hired,

"shisha" or "Hookah" is an oriental tobacco pipe with a long, flexible tube which draws smoke through water contained in a receptacle.





CIPA REGISTERS OVER 5000 COMPANIES DURING LOCKDOWN



ompanies & Intellectual Property Authority (CIPA) managed to beat the odds and continued their business during the Extreme Social Distancing period.

Between April and May 2020, CIPA managed to register 5121 companies using the Online Business Registration System (OBRS) compared to 4347 in the same period.

CIPA Registrar General Mr Conductor Masena told members of the media yesterday that OBRS has increased access to CIPA service and the organisation's operational efficiency.

Mr Masena said currently they are able to register a company and business within 24hrs and therefore urged companies to take advantage of OBRS.

He said the Ministry of Trade and Industry has agreed to their request to extend Re-registration of companies until December 2020 due to Covid-19 pandemic.

Mr Masena also said they did not deregister companies that failed to submit annual returns, adding that the deadline for submission is until the end of State of Emergency.



For her part, Companies and Business Names Registrar Ms Hilda Mocuminyane said re-registration of companies is important for data integrity.

CIPA Authorities also made a call to register trademarks before publishing them on social media since their ideas can be stolen.



KNOW YOUR ZONES

Extreme Social Distancing ended on Wednesday signaling the end of the three phases which were introduced to curb the spread of the virus in the country. The Presidential Task Force has developed a survellance plan to monitor the disease. This resulted in the different zones to create cohorts for easier monitoring, easier tracing of contacts of positive cases and to avoid uncontrollable spread across the country.

The Inter-Zonal permit is therefore a requirement for people to travel from one zone to the other. Thirteen law enforcement check points have been designated across the country to monitor movements of people.

The nine (9) COVID -19 Zones are as follows;

- 1. Greater Gaborone zone
- 2. Greater Palapye zone
- 3. Greater Selibe Phikwe Zone
- 4. Greater Francistown
- 5. Boteti zone
- 6. Chobe zone
- 7. Maun zone
- 8. Gantsi zone
- 9. Kgalagadi zone
